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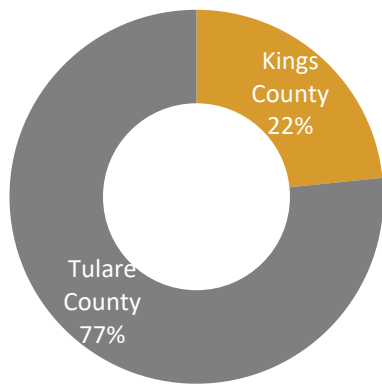
Summary

Each year, the Kings/Tulare Homeless Alliance (Alliance) conducts a Point in Time (PIT) count of the number of people experiencing homelessness within Kings and Tulare Counties. Information gathered through the PIT survey is used by the Alliance to better understand the issues associated with homelessness, including causes of homelessness, service needs of the homeless, the region's unmet housing needs, and trends over time of homelessness in the region.

The 2019 PIT was held on the night of January 23, 2019. This one-day PIT survey provides a snapshot of the adults, children and unaccompanied youth living in Kings and Tulare Counties, who meet HUD's definition of homeless. It is important to note that the results of the count are influenced by a variety of factors such as weather, number of volunteers canvassing and the ability to locate and engage with people experiencing homelessness on the night of the count.

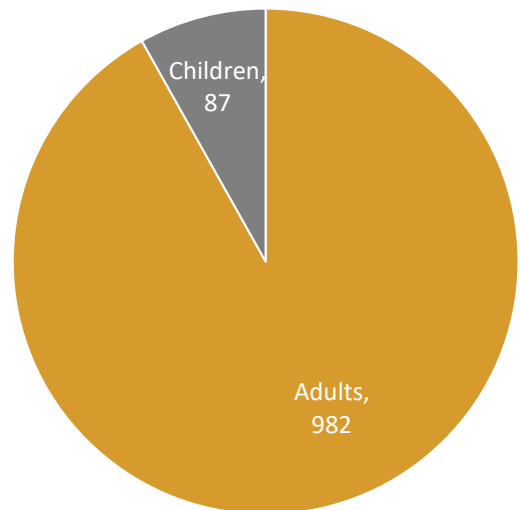
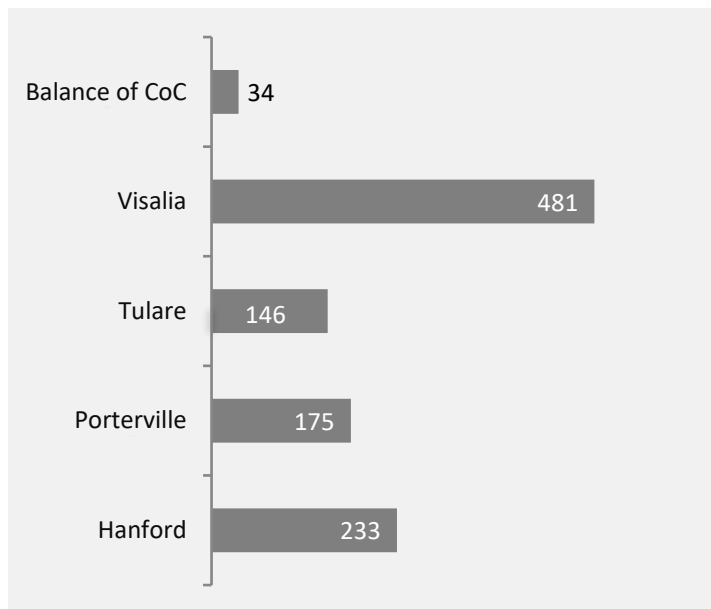


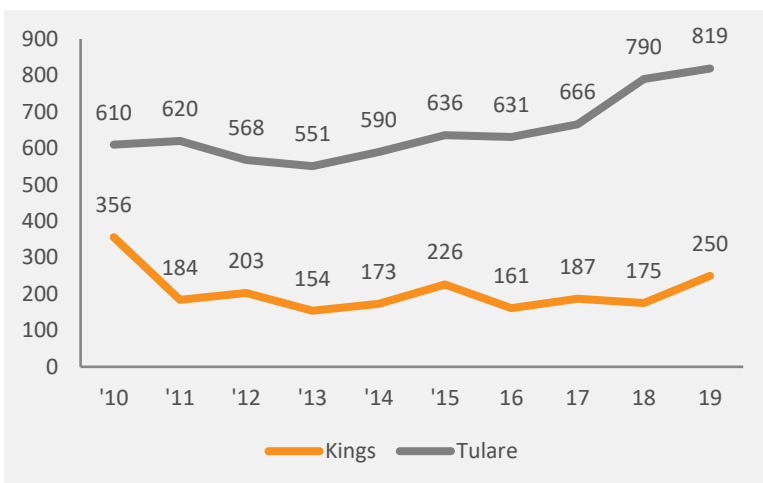

Trends

Homelessness increased by 11% over the prior year (1,069 in 2019 vs. 965 in 2018).

Since its low point in 2013, homelessness has increased 52% (1069 in 2019 vs. 705 in 2013) in the bi-county region.

Homelessness in **Kings County now represents 23% of the total bi-county homeless population.** In 2018, only 18% of those experiencing homelessness resided in Kings County.

The number of people experiencing **homelessness in Kings County increased by 43% since 2018** (250 in 2019 vs. 175 in 2018).

Tulare County has experienced a sharp increase in homelessness since 2017 (23%).

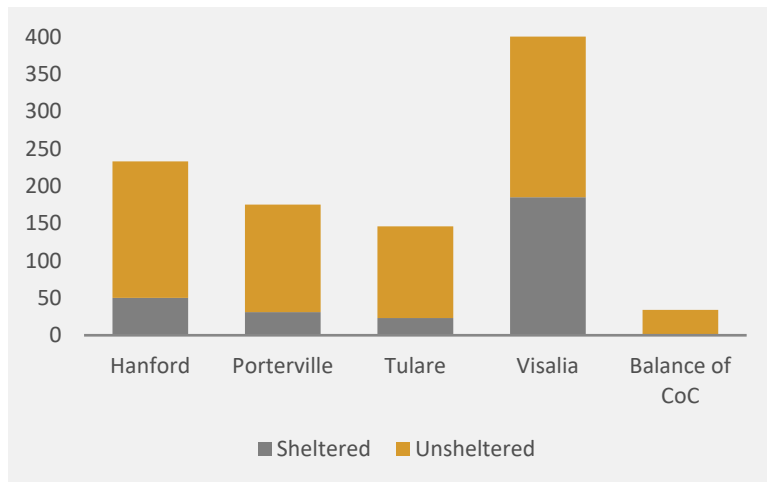

Where People Slept

Unsheltered

People with a primary nighttime residence that is a place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings, including a car, park, abandoned building, bus or train station, airport, or camping ground.

Sheltered

People sleeping in a shelter designated to provide temporary housing to homeless persons. This includes emergency shelters and transitional housing programs.

Eight out of every ten people experiencing homelessness in Kings County were unsheltered. In Tulare County, seven out of every ten people are unsheltered.

Introduction

The PIT is a count of sheltered and unsheltered homeless persons on a single night in January. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires that a PIT count is conducted by every community receiving McKinney-Vento funding for homeless services. Annual counts include only those who meet HUD's definition of homelessness which include only those who are sleeping in in emergency shelters, transitional housing, safe havens or unsheltered situations on the night of the PIT count.

PIT Counts provide valuable information regarding the current state of homelessness in our community and nationally. The PIT also provides information on the extent to which homeless persons live with disabling conditions or belong to other subpopulations.

The findings in this report are estimates of how many people are homeless on a given night throughout Kings and Tulare Counties. The PIT Count in Kings and Tulare Counties identified 1,069 people experiencing homelessness on the night of January 23, 2019.

Data for the 2019 report were collected in the following three categories, as required by HUD:

1. Persons in households with at least one adult and one child.

This category includes households with one adult and at least one child under age 18.

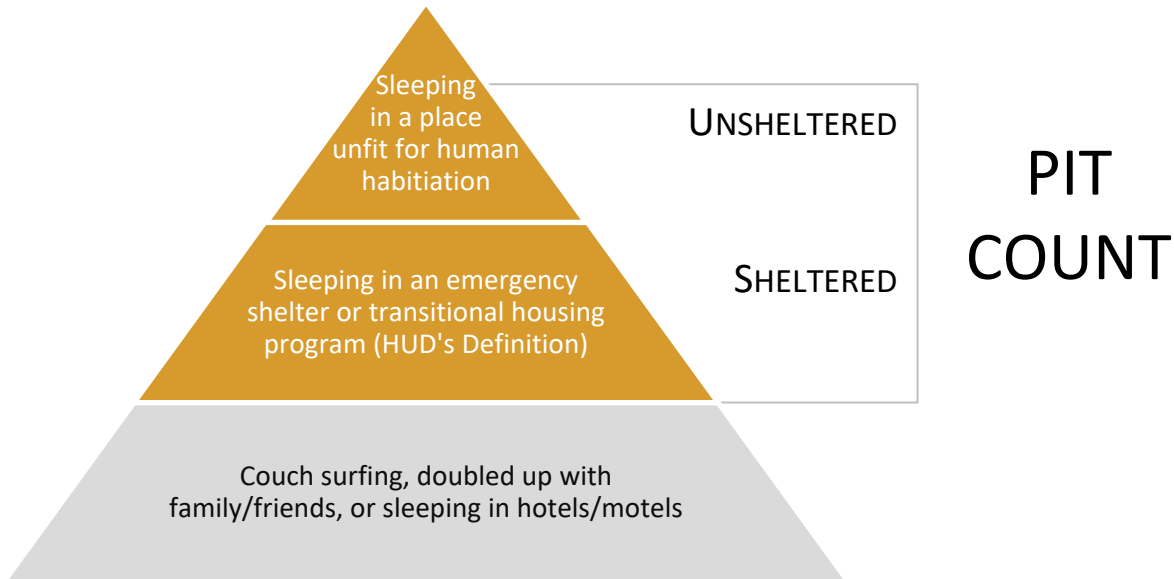
2. Persons in households without children.

This category includes single adults, adult couples with no children, and groups of adults (including adult parents with their adult children).

3. Persons in households with only children.

This category includes persons under age 18, including children in one-child households, adolescent parents (under age 18) and their children, adolescent siblings, or other household configurations composed only of children.

Similar to past enumerations, the 2019 PIT count does not include persons who were couch surfing, precariously housed, or "doubled up". Per the HUD definition of homelessness, persons who reported spending the night in a house or apartment, a permanent housing program, medical institution, or jail, were defined as housed.



The data provided by the PIT survey is not an absolute measure of the extent of homelessness in Kings and Tulare Counties. Rather, it provides a representative sample and trends of homeless persons in the region. This enables the Alliance and other planning bodies to tailor the activities and calculate the unmet needs of people experiencing homelessness or at risk of becoming homeless.

The information provided by the PIT not only increases our understanding of the homelessness situation, but is also a tool to monitor progress and create achievable goals in our work to end homelessness, including:

- Assist local planning efforts by identifying unmet needs;
- Approximate the size of our homeless population and its characteristics;
- Increase awareness about homelessness issues,
- Provide an avenue to identify shifting needs and prioritize resources accordingly;
- Create targeted intervention for homeless sub-populations;
- Outline main community goals for the upcoming year;
- Define benchmarks for tracking and measuring progress on the reduction of homelessness; and
- Identify strategies that provide positive outcomes to decrease the incidence of homelessness.

The annual PIT survey count requires a significant amount of coordination from volunteers, agencies and the community at large. As such, the Alliance would like to extend gratitude to the survey team leaders, volunteers, sponsors, agencies, and survey participants that helped make the count a success.

Data Collection Methodology

This study aims to gain an understanding of the number and trends of adults, children and unaccompanied youth living in Kings and Tulare Counties who meet HUD's definition of homeless. The PIT Count uses the HUD definition of homelessness in Federal regulation 24 CFR §578.3. Data are collected at both the individual and household level by utilizing two methods: the questionnaire and the HMIS (Homeless Management Information System) Database.

The Kings/Tulare PIT Count uses a census methodology, in which all homeless persons are counted throughout the bi-county region. This counting approach provides a direct and complete count of all people and their characteristics.

Questionnaire

Basic demographic and socio-economic information of individuals and households who are living in uninhabitable locations and of persons residing in shelters that do not actively enter information into HMIS was collected through administering a questionnaire (Appendix B). The survey instrument captured demographic information such as age, income, relationship to head of household and place of habitation, along with duration of homelessness, and reason for current episode of homelessness.

HMIS Database

The sheltered portion of the count is extracted from data in the region's Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). HMIS includes data on all persons who occupied an emergency voucher, shelter or transitional housing bed on the night of the count. This information is available from emergency shelters and transitional housing programs that actively enter client level data into HMIS. This includes all the same demographic and socio-economic data fields captured by the questionnaire.

As of January 23, 2019 there were 40 programs in Kings and Tulare counties that actively enter data into HMIS. This represents 98% of the programs providing housing to the homeless population within the bi-county region.

Surveying

The PIT Count collected information on where homeless people slept on the night of January 23, 2019. It was held in conjunction with Project Homeless Connect (PHC) events held in Hanford, Porterville, Tulare and Visalia on January 24-25, 2019. As in prior years, combining the PHC and PIT events have led to a tremendous success in improved data quality and coverage.

In order to successfully complete the count, volunteers engaged in intake and assessment through PHC, street canvassing, and meal site counts, while the HMIS method was implemented through residential emergency and transitional housing programs that actively enter data into the database.

Service Count: For the 2019 PIT, the Alliance contracted with Simtech Solutions for the Counting US mobile app. Counting Us replaced paper surveys for the majority of street outreach. Counting Us was also used in lieu of HMIS at the PHC events. We did experience technical difficulties in using the web-based app in areas that had unreliable internet connections. In these instances, a paper survey was used to conduct the interview. All intake volunteers were required to attend a specialized training session prior to participating in the count.

Street Canvassing: The questionnaire took approximately 15 minutes to complete and was conducted in either English or Spanish. Teams of volunteers were sent out into the community to pre-assigned locations. In preparation to administer the questionnaire, a list of locations throughout the community where homeless persons congregate was created. The PIT committee mapped census areas based on cities and unincorporated areas of Kings and Tulare counties, highlighting “hot spots” (i.e. parks, soup kitchen, recycling centers, the river) within each region where the homeless are known to congregate.

Team leaders with experience in homeless census tracking were assigned to individual mapped regions. They were responsible for recruiting volunteers for their respective PIT team and were strongly encouraged to include homeless, formerly homeless and bilingual volunteers. All team leaders and volunteers were required to attend a mandatory training in preparation for the survey. When possible, canvass teams were partnered with service providers in order to disseminate information about existing programs and services at the same time.

Meal Site Count: Volunteers administered questionnaires at sites where free meals are served to the public. The meal site count is focused on identifying and interviewing people who are homeless, but did not utilize a shelter on the night of January 23, 2019.

Residential Surveys: Residential surveys utilized both research methods. For the emergency and transitional shelter programs that actively enter client information into HMIS, the database administrator extracted the necessary data fields from the system to provide reliable, comparable data for the PIT. Shelter programs who do not participate in HMIS were visited in order to capture PIT information on their clients residing in their program the night of the PIT count.

Limitations of the Study

While the PIT count provides valuable information about homelessness in our community, it has some limitations that are important to keep in mind:

Variations in site participation: The PIT count relies heavily on the participation of social service organizations, many of whom are stretched thin and have limited staff capacity. While every effort is made to ensure that all relevant organizations participate, there is inevitably some variation in the level and rate of participation of sites/ service providers from year to year.

Refusals to participate: Some respondents refuse to participate in the count because they want to preserve their privacy, do not trust service providers, or do not consider themselves homeless.

Difficulty finding people: It is widely acknowledged in all the research on homelessness that surveys undercount homeless populations. It is easy to “miss” homeless individuals and families -- they might not receive services at the agencies where homeless persons were counted on the night of the PIT Count, or if they do frequent a particular agency, they might not be there during the count. Youth on their own, recently homeless individuals and families who are doubled up with friends and relatives are often underrepresented among those who access homeless services.¹

Unsheltered homeless people are particularly difficult to count. By definition, they are living on the street, in automobiles and other kinds of uninhabitable, temporary housing situations that limit the opportunity to complete the survey.² People enter and leave homelessness frequently and may become homeless shortly after the PIT Count. Furthermore, some individuals and families experiencing homelessness avoid accessing available services and try to hide from view. Even those who are not hiding are often difficult to locate. During the day, homeless camps are typically vacant and there is only a narrow window of time when campers can be located and questionnaires completed for the count.

Unaccompanied youth and children: As in years past, the Alliance experienced difficulty identifying homeless youth because they are not accessing services or frequenting typical homeless “hot spots”; do not appear homeless to enumerators; are more mobile throughout the day; and are more intermittently homeless.

Summary of Limitations

As explained by the United States Inter-Agency Council on Homelessness, “Due to barriers that exist for young people in accessing adult-only shelters and their lack of connection to most social services, many if not most youth experiencing homelessness go uncounted” (U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness, 2012a).

Self-reported data: Self-reported data should not be viewed as an exact number. Individuals choose whether or not to answer these highly personal questions or to do so truthfully. Therefore, the numbers provided in this report are only reflective of those who chose to answer these questions.

Validity and Reliability

Validity and reliability of the quantitative methodology was endorsed throughout the process. The volunteers who conducted the questionnaire were required to complete a mandatory training and report to their experienced team lead. In order to avoid duplication, volunteers asked each person if they had already completed an interview. Furthermore, the survey instrument collected personal identifying information that was used for de-duplication purposes.

The database administrator ran multiple data quality tests to ensure the accuracy and completeness of the subpopulation data entered into HMIS and to ensure data quality of all completed questionnaires.



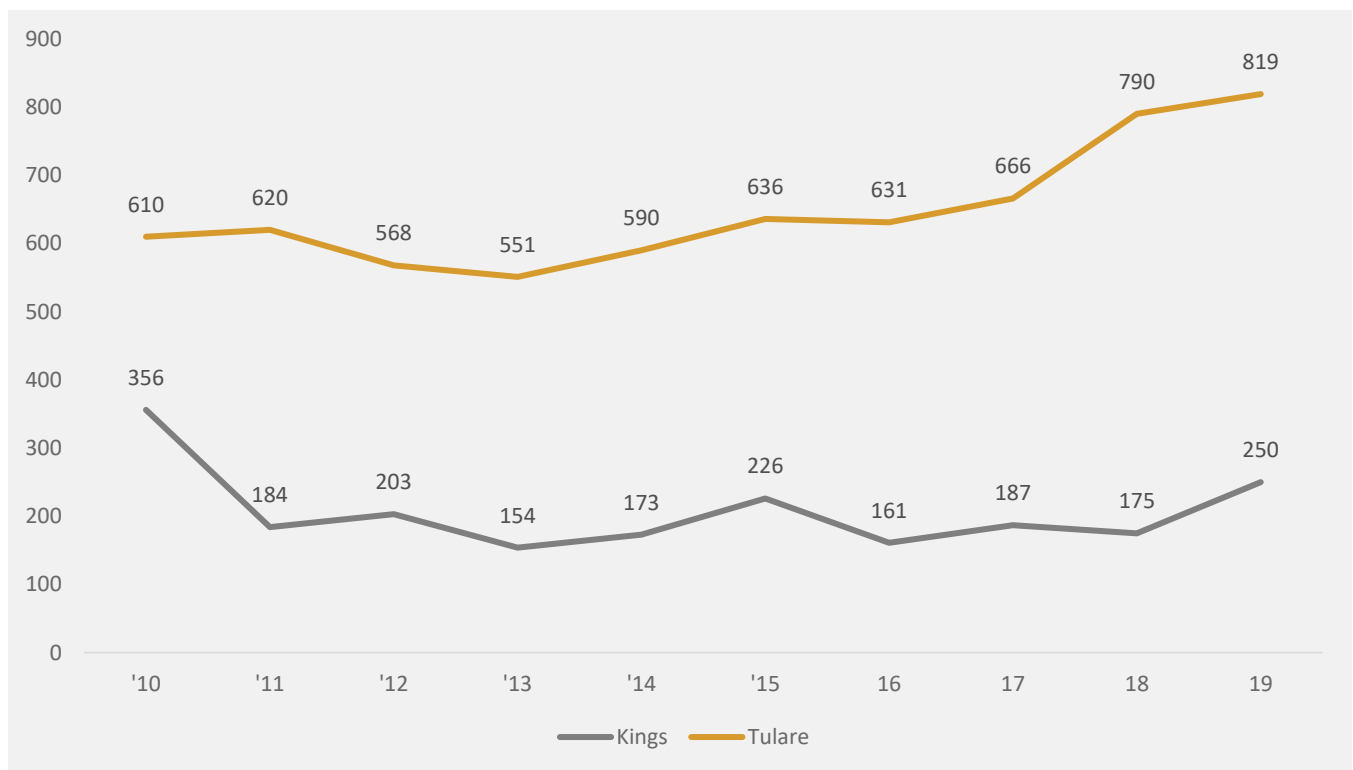

Survey Findings

The 2019 PIT Count collected data on individuals and families experiencing homelessness on the night of Wednesday, January 23, 2019 in Kings and Tulare Counties. The Count identified 780 people who were sleeping in unsheltered situations and 289 people that were sleeping in an emergency shelter or transitional housing. In all, 1,069 people met HUD’s definition of homelessness on the night of the count.

Kings County experienced a sharp increase over the 2018 count and now represents 23% of people experiencing homelessness in the bi-county region. Since a low in 2013, the bi-county region has experienced a 52% increase in people experiencing homelessness (1,069 in 2019 vs. 705 in 2013).

FIGURE 1. HOMELESSNESS TREND BY COUNTY 2010-2019



According to the HUD’s 2018 Annual Homeless Assessment Report, there were 552,830 people experiencing homelessness in the United States. This figure represents .18% of the nation’s total population. Figure 1 highlights the number of people experiencing homelessness counted during the PIT as a percentage of its total population in the bi-county region. Hanford (.43%) and Visalia (.39%) exceed both the state and national averages of .35% and .18%, respectively. Both Porterville (.32%) and Tulare (.25%) exceed the national average (.18%), but are slightly below the state average (.35%).

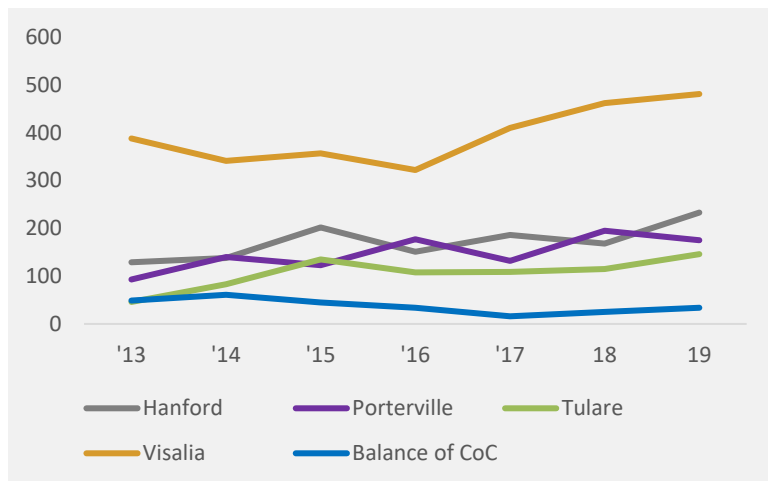

Geographic Analysis

Three out of every four people experiencing homelessness in the bi-county region live in Tulare County.

Since 2013, Hanford, Porterville and Tulare have experienced a dramatic increase in homelessness (81%, 88% and 217% respectively).

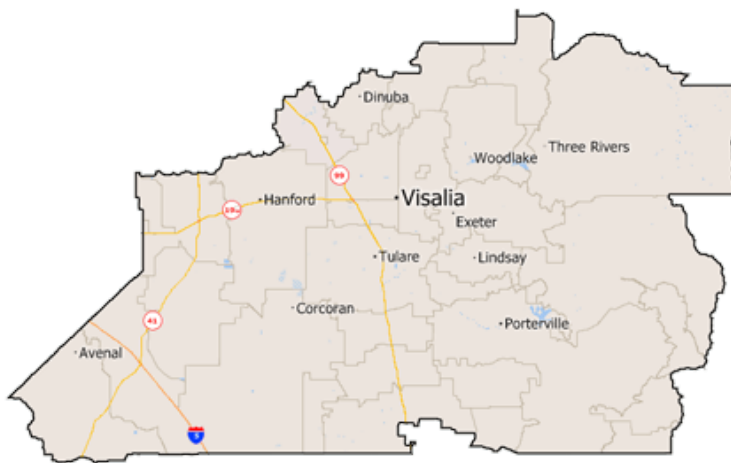
The primary reason for the 10% reduction in homelessness in Porterville is that people were categorized between East Porterville and Porterville (175 in 2019 vs. 195 in 2018). This new categorization resulted in the balance of CoC number to increase by 36% (34 in 2019 vs. 25 in 2018).

The 39% increase in homelessness in Hanford may be due to increased street outreach efforts (233 in 2019 vs. 168 in 2018).

Population Comparison

Hanford has the highest per capita rate of homelessness in the region (.43%), followed by Visalia (.39%).

Both Hanford (+23%) and Visalia (+11%) have a higher per capita rate of homelessness than the state per capita rate of .35%. **These two cities also exceed the per capita rate in Los Angeles of .33%.**

The Kings/Tulare CoC is considered an “Other Largely Urban CoC” for the purposes of national analysis. **This category represents 15% of all CoCs in the United States** (*Annual Homeless Assessment Report, 2018*).

“Other Largely Urban CoCs,” such as Kings/Tulare, accounted for just six percent of all homelessness in the United States (*Annual Homeless Assessment Report, 2018*).

FIGURE 4. ADULTS AND CHILDREN

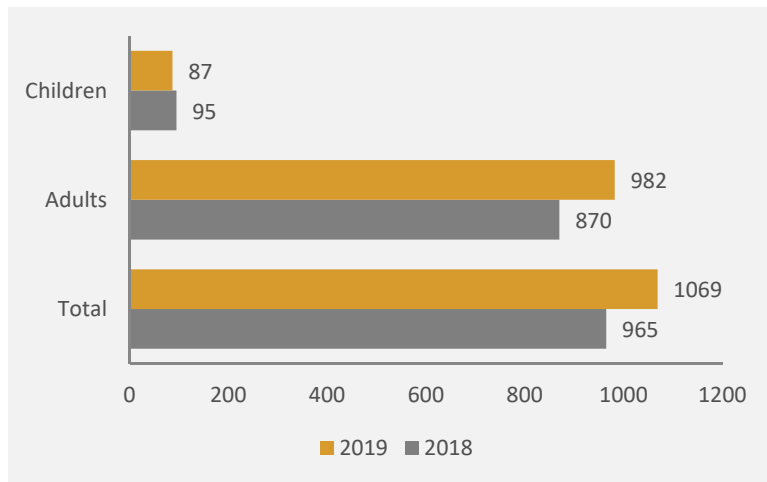


FIGURE 5. TRENDS BY CITY, ADULTS

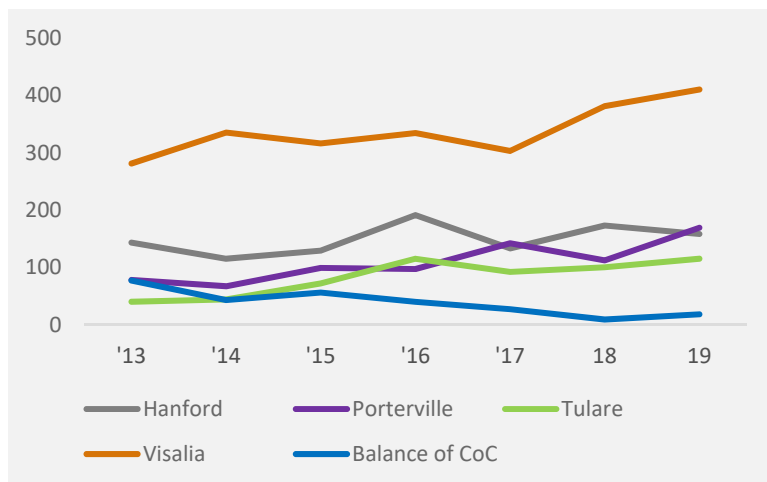
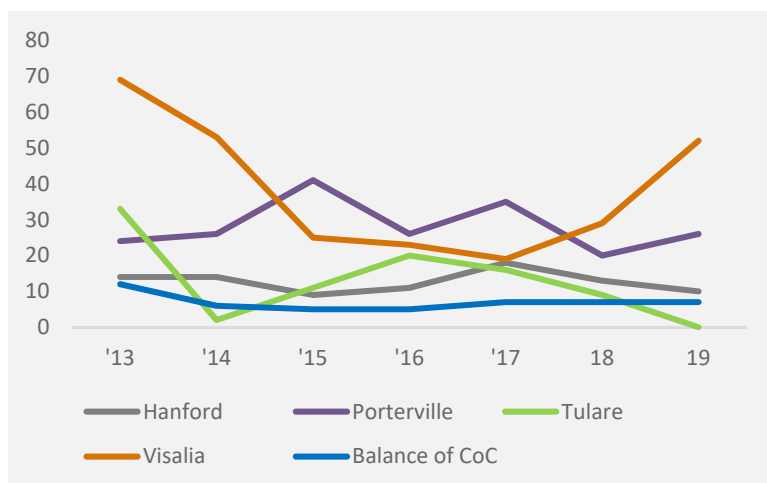


FIGURE 6. TRENDS BY CITY, CHILDREN



Adults & Children

982 (92%) were adults experiencing homelessness.

The number of children experiencing homelessness slightly declined from the 2018 count (87 in 2019 vs. 95 in 2018).

Nearly 85% of people experiencing homelessness are over the age of 24. This incidence is less than our “Other Largely Urban CoC” counterparts who report that 91% are over the age of 24 (*Annual Homeless Assessment Report, 2018*).

The percentage of children experiencing homelessness is dramatically higher in the Kings/Tulare CoC than in comparison to our “Other Largely Urban CoC” counterparts (8% versus 1%, respectively) (*Annual Homeless Assessment Report, 2018*).

FIGURE 7. HOUSEHOLD COMPOSITION

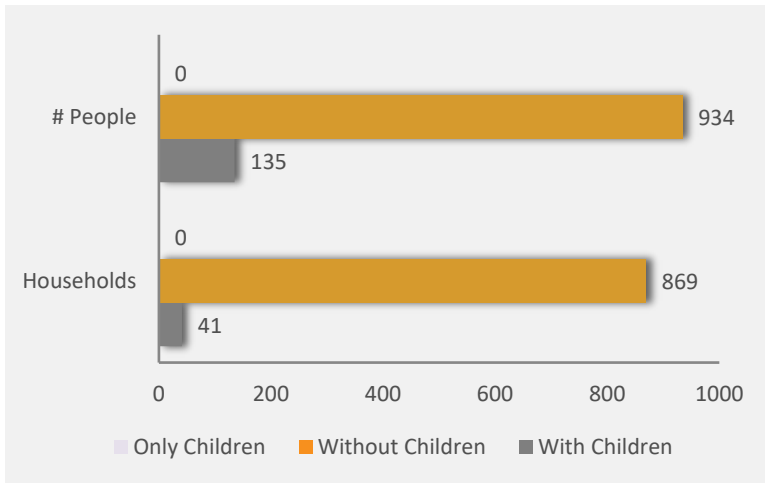

Household Composition

Over three-quarters (**87%**) of people experiencing homelessness are in **single households or households without children.**

In **households with children**, the **average family size is 3.3.**

Children under the age of 18 made up **64% of people experiencing homelessness in families.**

One in four people experiencing homelessness in families with children **were unsheltered** (34 people).

One-third of adults experiencing homelessness in families with children **have been homeless one year or longer.**

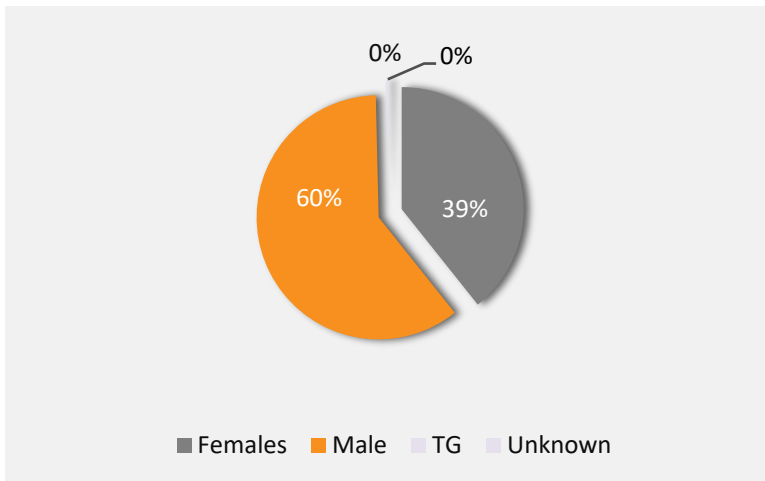

Race & Ethnicity

It is important to note that **race classification is exclusive of ethnicity** responses.

The **majority of homeless** persons identified their ethnicity as **Non-Hispanic/ Non-Latino** (52%), down from 2018.

There was a **significant increase in respondents not choosing an ethnicity or race in 2019**. We believe this is due to the Counting Us app used to administer surveys.

Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islanders (1%) **and Asians** (1%) continue to **have a very low prevalence amongst the homeless population in Kings and Tulare Counties**.

Males continue to represent the majority of homeless persons with 60% prevalence versus female (39%). These figures have remained consistent with results from prior years.

FIGURE 9. CURRENT HOUSING

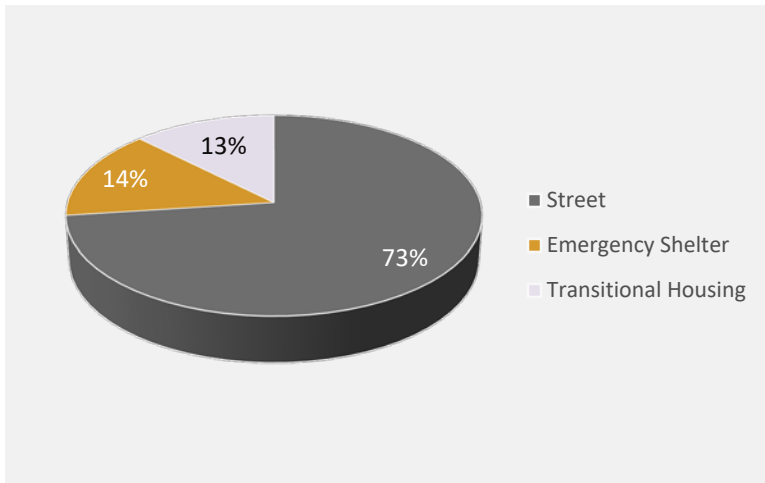


FIGURE 10. SHELTERED VS. UNSHELTERED, BY CITY

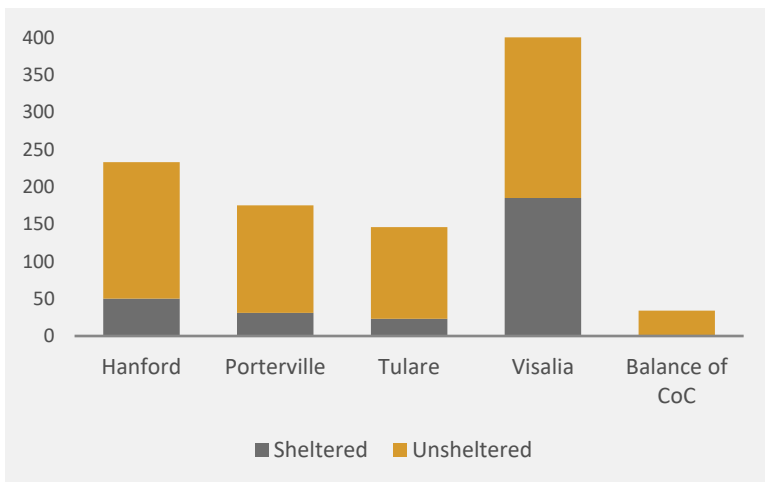
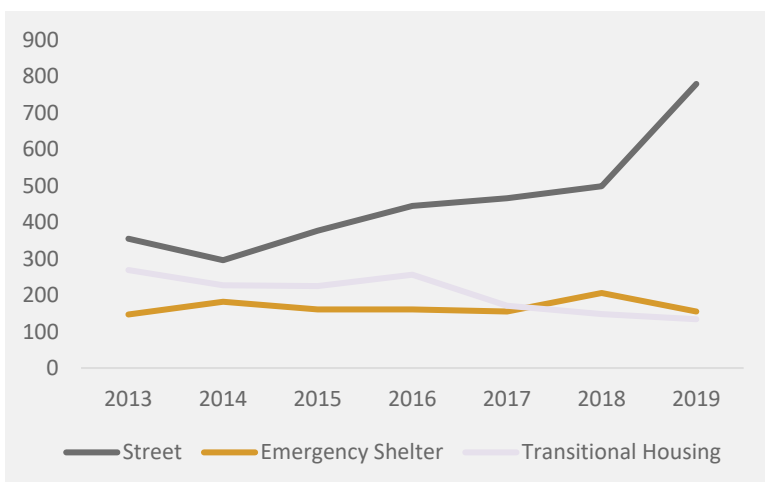


FIGURE 11. CURRENT HOUSING, TREND OVER TIME



Current Housing

People sleeping in unsheltered situations has risen 263% since 2013 (780 in 2019 vs. 296 in 2013).

Since last year, unsheltered homelessness increased 20% (780 in 2019 vs. 650 in 2018).

In 2018, the Kings/Tulare region had the 4th highest rate (67%) of unsheltered homelessness in the United States within those CoCs that were categorized as “Other Largely Urban CoCs”. This year, 73% of our unsheltered population is unsheltered (Annual Homeless Assessment Report, 2018).

Despite the number of homeless increasing, the total number of homeless beds has remained virtually unchanged from 2013 (795 in 2019 vs. 790 in 2013).

FIGURE 12. PER CAPITA RATE OF UNSHELTERED HOMELESS

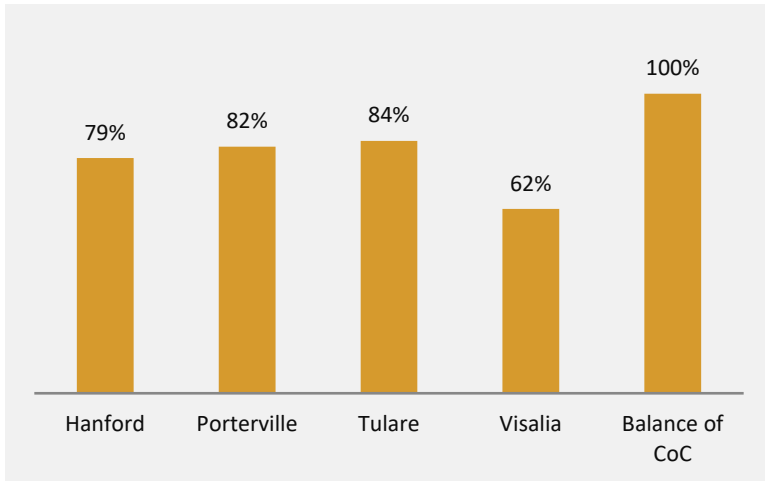

Unsheltered Homelessness

Tulare continues to have the highest prevalence of unsheltered homelessness within the incorporated areas of the bi-county region (**84%**).

Nine out of every ten (**90%**) people with a disabling condition are **sleeping in a place not meant for human habitation**.

Nearly all chronic homeless persons are sleeping in unsheltered situations (96% or 288 persons). Nationally, the unsheltered rate amongst those experiencing chronic homelessness is 65%. (*Annual Homeless Assessment Report, 2018*)

Nationally, 35% of the homeless population are sleeping in unsheltered situations. In Kings and Tulare Counties, **the prevalence of unsheltered homelessness is 73%**. (*Annual Homeless Assessment Report, 2018*)

FIGURE 13. PER CAPITA RATE OF SHELTERED HOMELESS

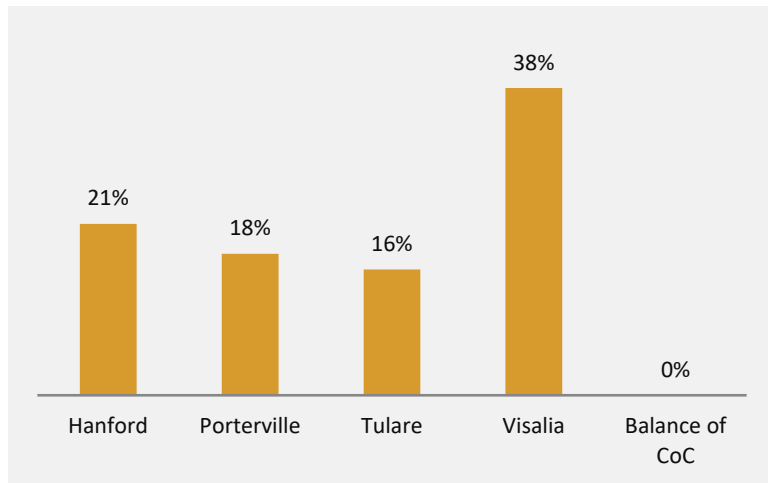

Sheltered Homelessness

289 people (27%) were sleeping in sheltered locations.

Visalia has the highest rate of people who are experiencing homelessness sleeping in sheltered locations (38%).

The decrease in sheltered homelessness in the Balance of CoC is due to the closure of the emergency shelter operated by Open Gate Ministries in Dinuba.

Average family size for households with children in sheltered situations is 3.29.

Many shelters are restricted to certain sub-populations such as victims of domestic violence, transition-age youth, or single males/females.

FIGURE 14. CHRONIC HOMELESS TREND, 2013-2019

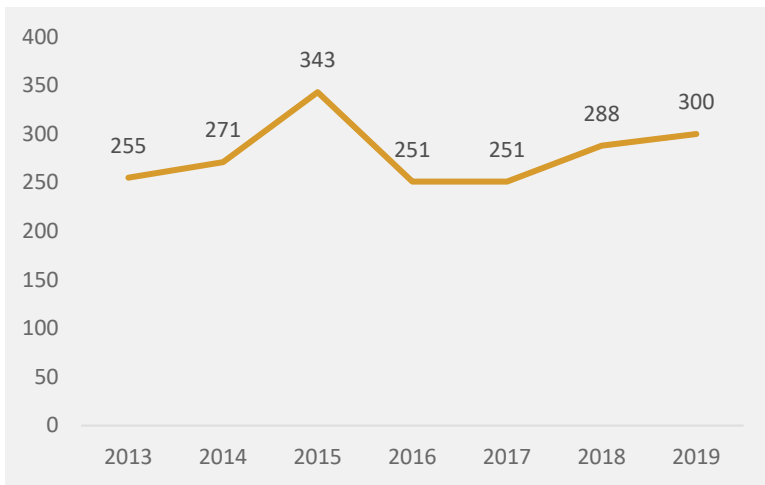


FIGURE 15. CHRONIC HOMELESS BY HOUSING STATUS, 2013-2019

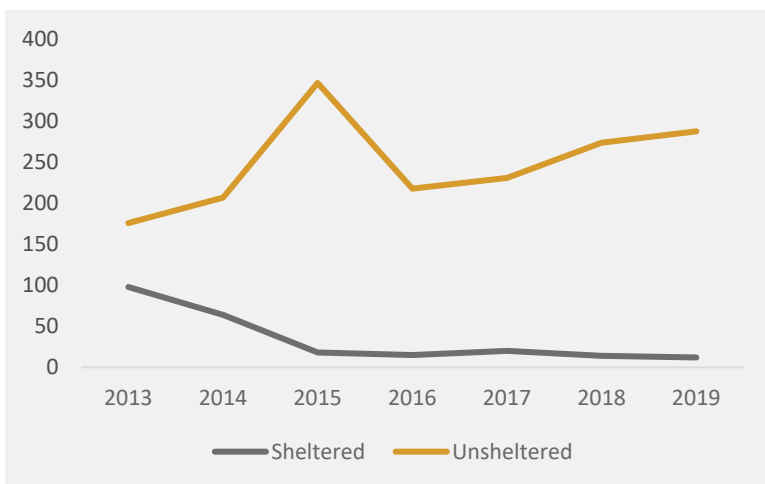
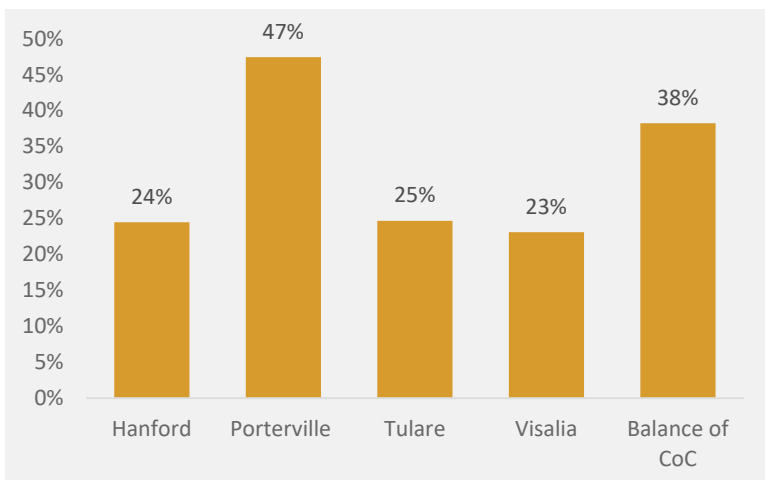


FIGURE 16. PER CAPITA RATE OF CHRONIC HOMELESS



Chronic Homelessness

28% of people experiencing homelessness **meet the definition of chronic homelessness.**

There has been an **18% increase in chronic homelessness since 2013** (300 in 2019 vs. 255 in 2013) **and a 4% increase over 2018** (288).

The average **length of homelessness for a chronically homeless person** in Kings and Tulare Counties is **5.11 years**, an increase over 2018 (4.47 years).

In 2015, HUD no longer categorized people in Transitional Housing as chronically homeless, which is why the number of people sleeping in sheltered situations decreased.

FIGURE 17. HOMELESS VETERANS BY SHELTER TYPE

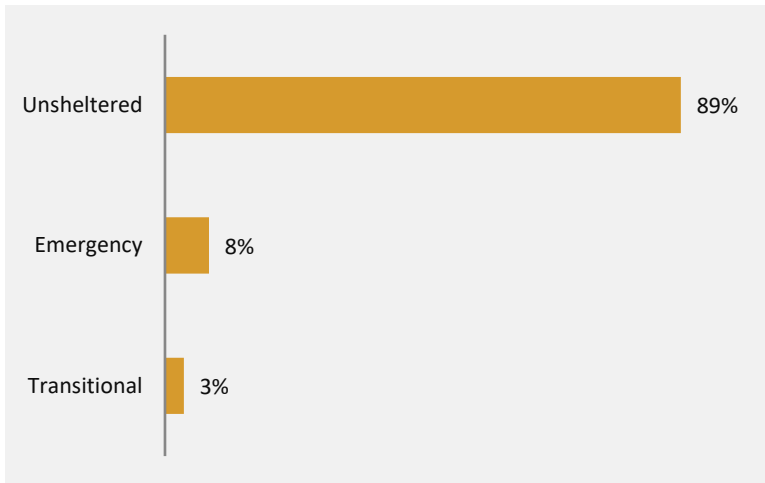


FIGURE 18. GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION, VETERANS

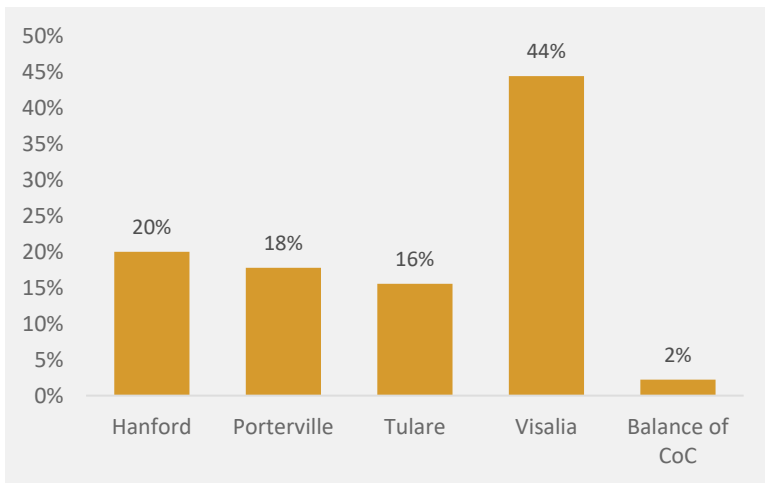
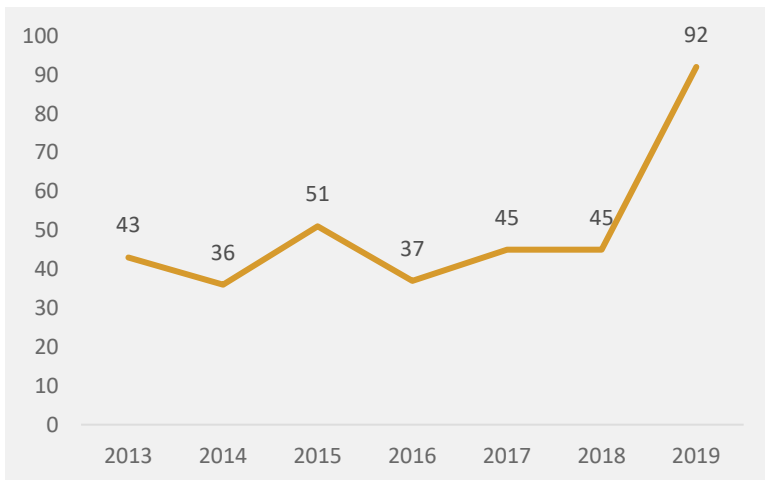


FIGURE 19. VETERAN TREND, 2013-2019



Veterans

Veterans represent 9% of homeless adults in Kings and Tulare Counties.

The national instance of veteran homelessness is just under 9%.

(Annual Homeless Assessment Report, 2018)

The number of **veterans experiencing homelessness rose sharply in 2019** (90 in 2019 vs. 45 in 2018).

Nearly nine out of every ten veterans cites having a disabling condition (86%).

Nine out of every ten **veterans (89%) experiencing homelessness are sleeping in unsheltered situations.**

Thirty-seven percent (**37%**) of **veterans are chronically homeless** versus twenty-eight percent (28%) of non-veteran adults.

FIGURE 20. DISABLED PERSONS BY SHELTER TYPE

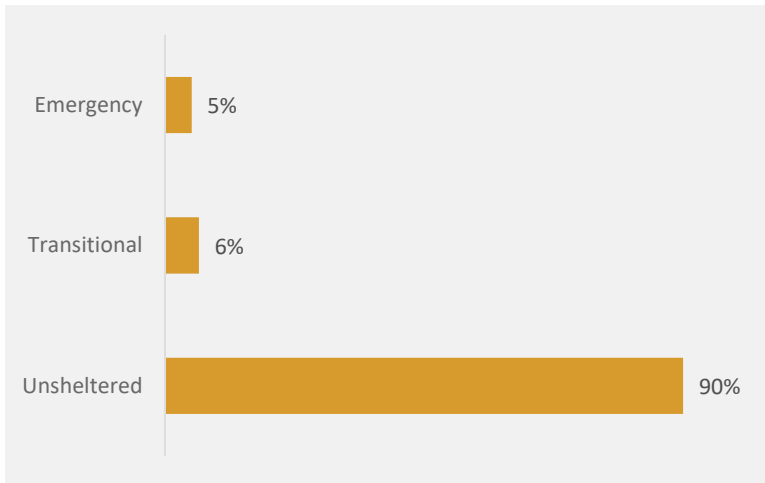


FIGURE 21. DISABLING CONDITION BY GENDER

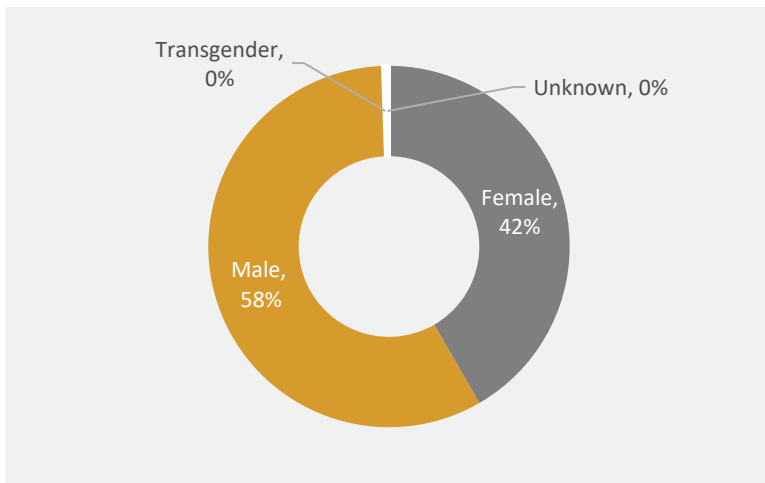
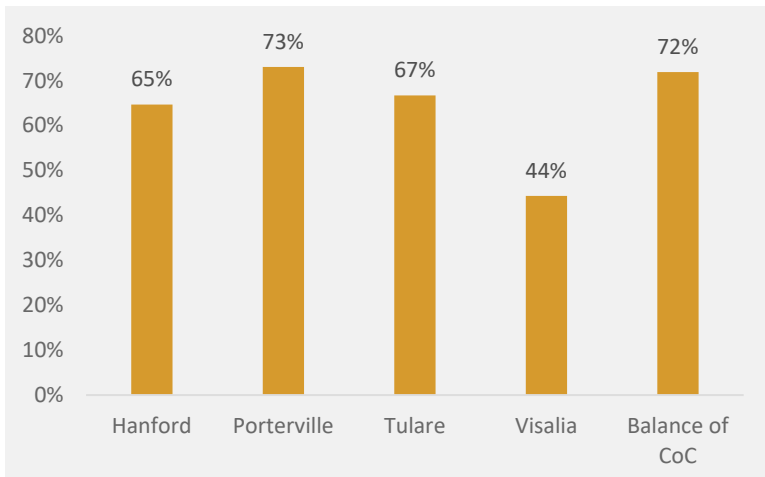


FIGURE 22. PER CAPITA RATE OF DISABLING CONDITION



Disabling Conditions

Of the 982 adults who responded to the disabling condition questions, **one out of every two** indicated they **have a disabling condition** (57%).

Porterville has the highest per capita rate of people experiencing homelessness with a disabling condition (73%), followed by Balance of CoC (72%), Tulare (67%), Hanford (65%), and Visalia (44%).

Adults with a disabling condition spend an average of 3.83 years homeless in Kings and Tulare Counties.

Over half of the respondents indicate they **have a mental health condition** (57%).

Only eighteen percent (18%) of adults with a disabling condition **receive SSI/SSDI** benefits.

FIGURE 23. SOURCES OF INCOME

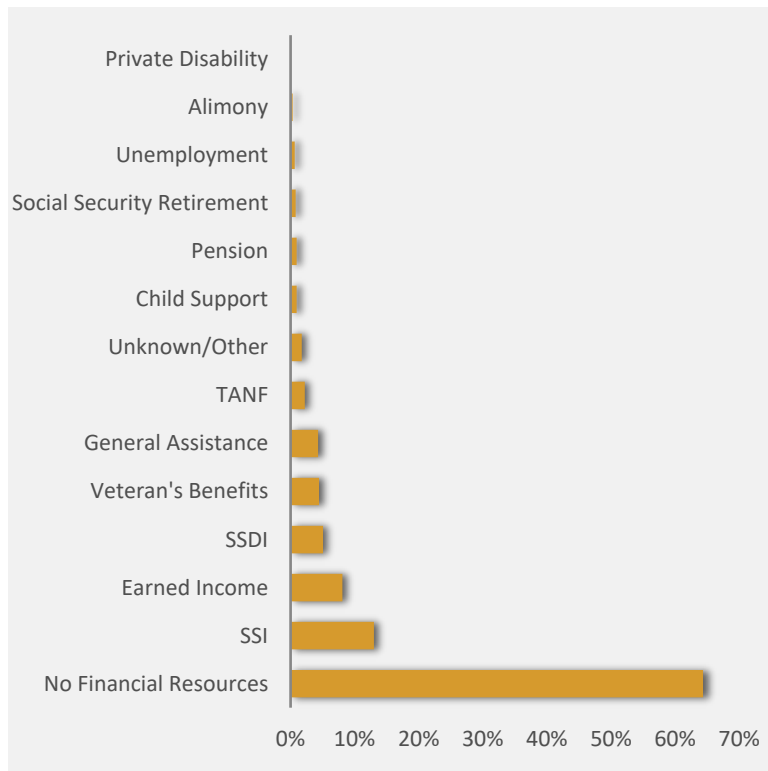
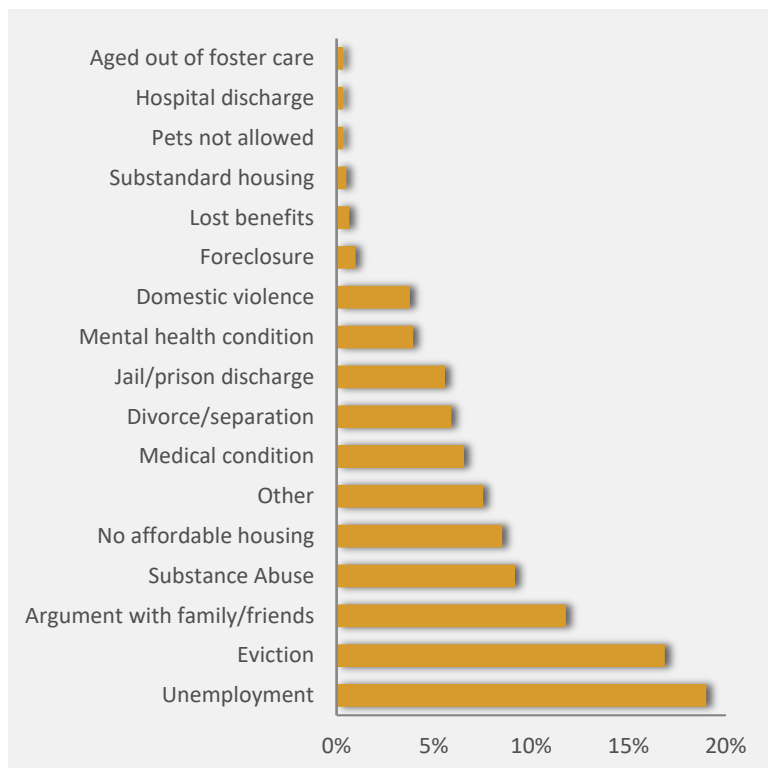


FIGURE 24. REASONS CITED FOR HOMELESSNESS



Sources of Income[^]

Of those responding to the income question, **the highest percentage were receiving SSI or SSDI (18%)**, followed by Earned Income (8%).

Sixty-four percent (**64%**) of respondents indicated that they **did not have any financial resources**.

Nine out of every ten people experiencing chronic homelessness have a disabling condition, **yet only 27% receive Social Security benefits**.

Reasons for Homelessness[^]

Unemployment continues to be the **most common reason cited for people experiencing unsheltered homelessness (19% or 116 adult respondents)**.

Eviction was the second highest reason (17% or 103 adult respondents).



FIGURE 25. HOMELESSNESS TREND BY COUNTY, 2010-2019

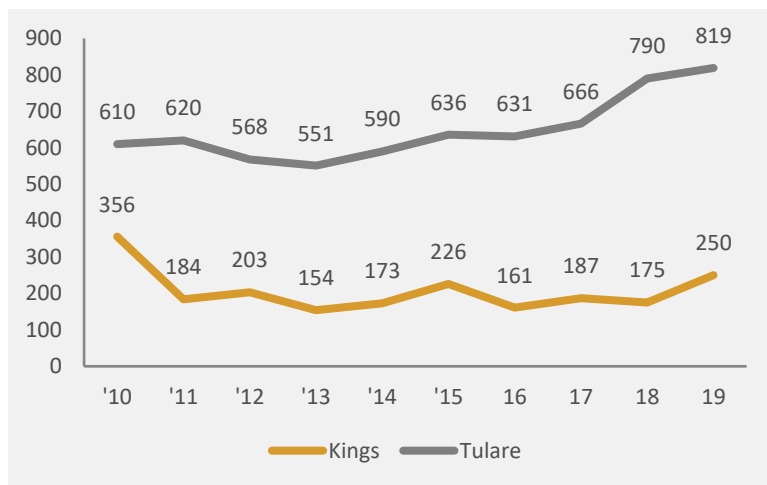


FIGURE 26. HOMELESSNESS TREND, 2010-2019



Trend over Time

Homelessness in Tulare County has risen by 209 people since 2010 or a 34% increase (819 in 2019 vs. 610 in 2010).

Kings County homelessness has decreased by 106 people since 2010, or a 30% reduction (250 in 2019 vs. 356 in 2010). However, homelessness has drastically increased since 2018 (250 in 2019 vs. 175 in 2019).

The number of people experiencing **homelessness** in Kings and Tulare Counties **is on the rise**. Without permanent housing solutions, homelessness will continue to increase.

On the night of January 23, 2019, **there were 367 people residing in PSH & RRH beds that would have otherwise been counted as homeless.**



FIGURE 27. HOUSING INVENTORY, 2018-2019

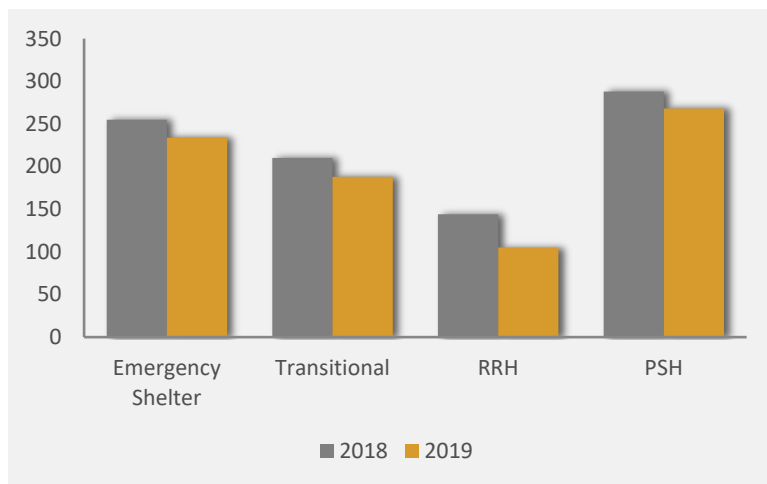
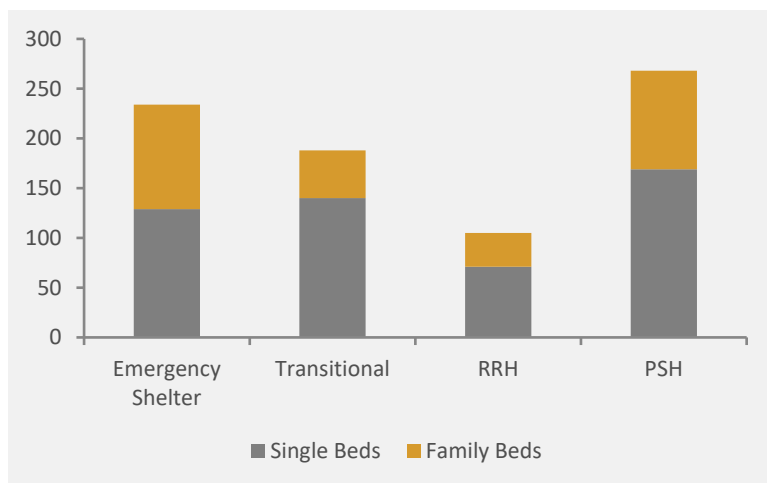


FIGURE 28. HOUSING INVENTORY, SINGLE VS FAMILY BEDS



Bed Capacity and Unmet Needs

On the night of the PIT, the bi-county region had **268 Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) beds and 105 Rapid Re-Housing (RRH) beds available** to serve people experiencing homelessness. An additional **26 Permanent Supportive Housing beds were under development.**

The development of low-barrier Permanent Supportive Housing and Rapid Re-Housing beds continue to remain a top priority for program development in the region.

On average, **there are only six homeless housing vouchers available per month** through the Coordinated Entry System.

Looking Ahead

Together with its partners, the Alliance has undertaken a number of targeted strategies to combat homelessness within the region and maximize the limited resources available.

Efforts include:

- Utilizing the coordinated entry system to prioritize those most in need for housing assistance;
- Quickly housing people with disabilities that are experiencing homelessness through the Homeless Disability Advocacy Program and Mainstream Voucher Program;
- Implementing a Flex Funding Pool to assist with barriers to housing placements such as utility arrearages and security deposits;
- Hosting monthly case management roundtables to staff cases, share best practices, and strategize on housing placements;
- Hiring a Landlord Relations Specialist to develop landlord relationships, maximize the Landlord Mitigation Fund, and identify new affordable housing opportunities;
- Collaborating with mainstream benefit agencies to leverage other homeless assistance programs such as Bringing Families Home, Housing Support Program, and the Homeless Disability Advocacy Program.

Appendix A – Definitions

Bridge Housing

Short-term housing facility generally intended for those individuals experiencing homelessness that are matched to a long-term housing opportunity but are waiting for administrative requirements to clear.

Child Only Households

Households where members are under the age of 18.

Chronically Homeless (CH)

Individual or head of household with a disability who lives in a place not meant for human habitation, a safe haven, or in an emergency shelter; and who has either been continuously homeless for at least 12 months or has experienced at least four episodes of homelessness in the last 3 years where the combined occasions total at least 12 months. Occasions are separated by a break of at least seven nights. Stays in institutions of fewer than 90 days do not constitute a break.

Continuum of Care (CoC)

Local planning body responsible for coordinating the full range of homelessness services in a geographic area, which may cover a city, county, metropolitan area, or even an entire state.

Couch Surfing

Describes situations where runaway or homeless youth are living in unstable and/or temporary living arrangements such as the couches or spare bedrooms of friends, lovers, or other family members⁶.

Disabling Condition

Any one of (1) a disability as defined in Section 223 of the Social Security Act; (2) a physical, mental, or emotional impairment which is (a) expected to be of long-continued and indefinite duration, (b) substantially impedes an individual's ability to live

independently, and (c) of a nature that such ability could be improved by more suitable housing conditions; (3) a developmental disability as defined in Section 102 of the Developmental Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act; (4) the disease of acquired immunodeficiency syndrome or any conditions arising from the etiological agency for acquired immunodeficiency syndrome; or (5) a diagnosable substance abuse disorder.

Emergency Shelter (ES)

A facility with the primary purpose of providing temporary shelter for homeless people.

Homeless

An individual or family who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence and seek shelter in places not meant for habitation such as cars, camps, streets and abandoned buildings. Public or privately operated congregate emergency shelters are also places that house persons and families who are experiencing a housing crisis.

Homeless Management Information System (HMIS)

A software application designed to record and store client-level information on the characteristics and service needs of homeless people. Each CoC maintains its own HMIS, which can be tailored to meet local needs, but must also conform to HUD's HMIS Data and Technical Standards.

Households with Adults and Children

People who are homeless as part of households that have at least one adult and one child under the age of 18.

Households with Adults Only

Households with single adults and adult couples unaccompanied by children under the age of 18.

Housing Inventory Chart (HIC)

The HIC is produced by each CoC and provides an annual inventory of beds that assist people in the CoC who are experiencing homelessness or leaving homelessness.

Navigation Center

Temporary low-barrier shelter offering case managers to connect homeless individuals and families to income, public benefits, health services, permanent housing, or other shelter.

Parenting Youth

Youth (under age 25) who identify as the parent or legal guardian of one or more children who are present with or sleeping in the same place as that youth parent.

Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH)

Designed to provide housing and supportive services on a long-term basis to formerly homeless people that have a disabling condition.

Point in Time Count (PIT)

An unduplicated one-night estimate of both sheltered and unsheltered homeless populations.

Rapid Re-Housing (RRH)

A program that provides financial assistance and services to help those experiencing homelessness to be quickly re-housed and stabilized. This is considered permanent housing.

Sheltered Homeless People

People who are living in a supervised publicly or privately operated shelter designated to provide temporary living arrangements (including congregate shelters, transitional housing, and hotels and motels

paid for by charitable organizations or by federal, state, or local government programs for low-income individuals.)

Transitional Aged Youth (TAY)

Unaccompanied youth under age 25, including youth with children.

Transitional Housing (TH)

A program that provides temporary housing and supportive services for up to 24 months with the intent for the person to move towards permanent housing.

Unaccompanied Youth

People in households without children who are not part of a family with children or accompanied by their parent or guardian during their episode of homelessness, and who are between the ages of 18 and 24.

Unsheltered Homeless People

People with a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings.

Veteran

Refers to any person who served on active duty in the armed forces of the United States. This includes Reserves and National Guard members who were called up to active duty.

Victims of Domestic Violence

This subpopulation category includes persons who have been victims of domestic violence at any point in the past.

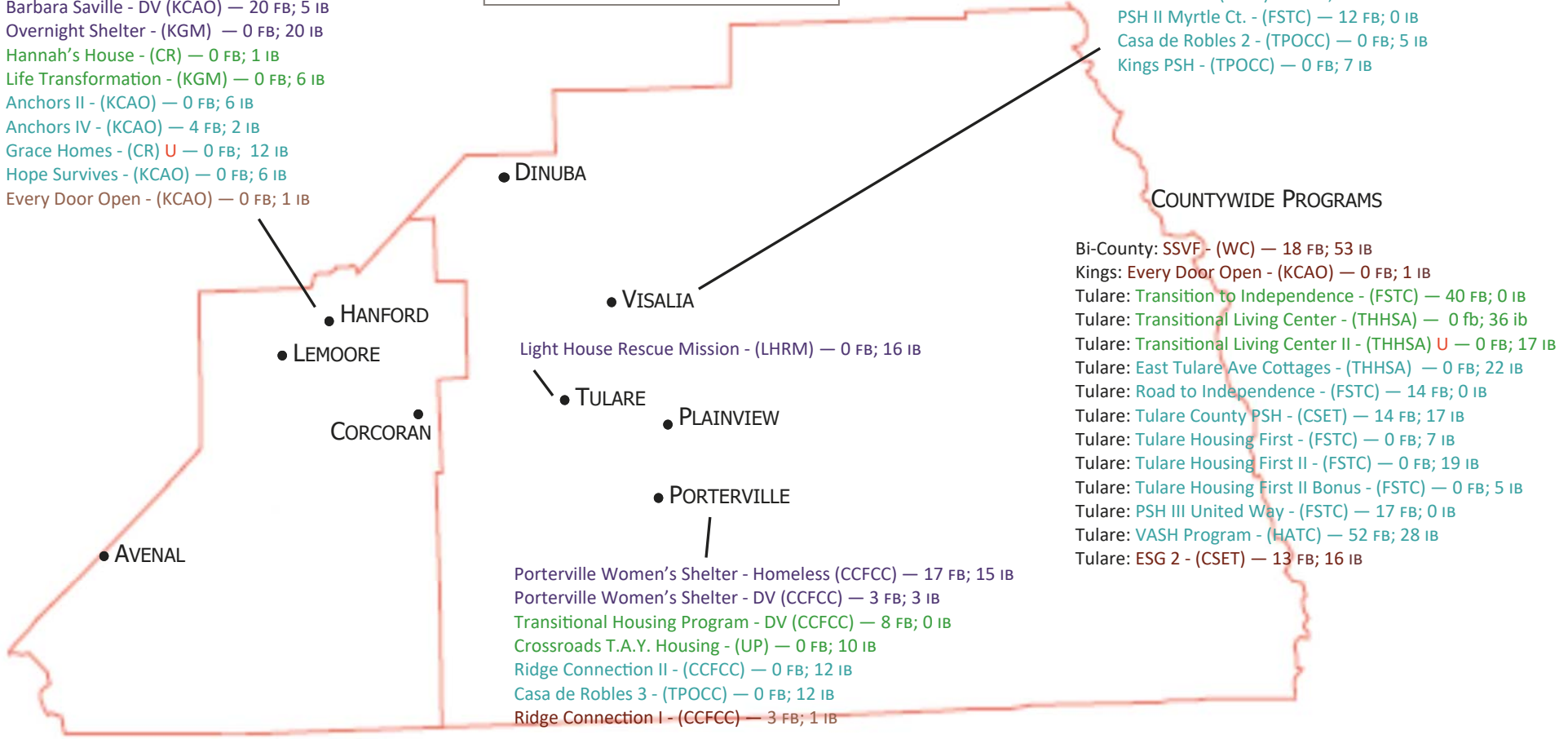
